Raritan Headwaters Becomes an Accredited Land Trust

2018 was a banner year for Raritan Headwaters - it was the Township year we became an accredited land trust. We proudly waved our banners at the October National Land Conservation Rally in Pittsburgh among the newest group of land trusts to be accredited across the United States.

YOU MAY WONDER: WHAT EXACTLY IS A LAND TRUST OUR AND WHY IS IT IMPORTANT TO BE ACCREDITED? Chester

Land trusts are nonprofits that acquire land and easements for conservation purposes. Raritan Headwaters is a land trust with a specialized mission: we have a legacy of preserving and stewarding lands that protect our region's rivers, streams and underground water resources. It's a mark of distinction and a national recognition of our commitment to professional excellence.

For 60 years, Raritan Headwaters has served as watershed watchdog for a 470-square-mile region in Hunterdon, Somerset and Morris counties. We have been preserving land since 1967. RHA owns and manages 11 wildlife preserves, holds 33 conservation easements and in partnership with others, we have preserved over 7,000 acres of critical open space. The accreditation seal we now display demonstrates our commitment to permanent land conservation in the North Branch and South Branch Raritan River watershed.

Thank you to all the partners, friends and donors who throughout the years chose RHA to collaborate and preserve precious lands that keep our watershed community healthy and a wonderful place to live, work and play. Through our land preservation, science, education and advocacy programs, RHA will continue to work to protect clean water for everyone within our reach.

A Family Gift Breathes New Life into Fairview Farm

Thanks to a generous gift from the children of longtime friend and former trustee, Betty Merck, RHA's Fairview Farm campus in Bedminster is better equipped to carry out our mission of protecting clean water.

The Merck family's donation funded the creation of state-of-the-art spaces and the opportunity to improve access for the public to encourage exploration, learning and engagement. All was accomplished while maintaining the farm's historic charm, integrity and character.

The Brick Cottage, now officially named the Betty Merck Science & Education Center, has been transformed into a multipurpose space ready to welcome visitors of all ages with a media-equipped meeting room and an Exploration Room, a cheerful space where children can interact, learn and create nature-related arts and crafts.









Across the parking lot is the **Raritan Room**, a nature interpretive center and classroom. This big, bright, open indoor/outdoor space is used for school field trips, summer camps and river-friendly adult workshops. It can be opened to the fresh air on warm sunny days and protected from the elements during rain and cold weather.



Fairview Farm Campus improvements have enabled RHA to welcome the entire community – school children, scouts, corporate partners, service clubs, family and friends to our beloved 170 acre wildlife preserve.

Educating Children and Connecting to Urban Areas

Decades from now, who will be the watchdogs of the Raritan River and its watershed communities? Who will care enough about our drinking water and wildlife habitats to fight for their protection?

We rely on today's children to be tomorrow's environmental stewards. That is why RHA's Education Team has worked hard to create a curriculum that is exciting, engaging and hopefully creates transformative experiences for kids of all ages – turning them on to the wonders of nature and wildlife!

Because of generous support from our friends and donors, we have been able to expand our education curriculum's scope, depth and impact. In 2018, more than 15,000 children participated in a school or scout program, field trip, nature camp and/or one of the many RHA activities and family events hosted throughout the year!



LIFECAMP

For the past five summers, we've taken our WaterWays program to Greater Newark LifeCamp located on the Lamington River in Pottersville. LifeCamp is a non-profit organization offering an enriching summer day camp experience for 300 Newark area youths.

During the six-week program, kids ages 6-13 put on water shoes, look for crayfish under rocks, and use nets to scoop up other tiny creatures, including insect larvae, fish, and snails. They learn how certain "benthic macroinvertebrates" are found only in streams with clean water. The kids find out about the sources of their drinking water, how their own behavior affects the quality of their water, and what they can do to help protect natural resources in their own communities. It is inspiring to watch the kids squirm at first sight of these little creatures, then embrace them as they start to understand how the smallest of things, including themselves, play an important part in the bigger world.

In 2018, The Bogs' 2% for Outdoor Education Grant was awarded to Raritan Headwaters to support our partnership with LifeCamp. The **\$5,000** grant award supported our efforts to expand our reach and continue to inspire kids of all ages and backgrounds to become tomorrow's nature enthusiasts.



RIVERFEST

RiverFest is our new, interactive assembly program that increases our ability to expand our reach to thousands of school children. It can take place any time of year, indoors or outdoors, for groups of up to 200 students. RHA educators – along with RHA-trained teachers, parents and community members – set up multiple stations with hands-on activities that teach ecology, chemistry, math, physics and other STEM disciplines – all relating to water. There's a macroinvertebrate station, where kids can examine tiny critters in stream water. At the bubble station, students learn about the geometry of soap bubbles. At "Incredible Journey," they pretend to be a water droplet as it completes its water cycle journey. All activities correspond to **Next Generation Science Standards** and by participating in a RiverFest event, the school receives credit for our River-Friendly School Program, as well as the NJ Eco-Schools and Sustainable Jersey for Schools programs.

In 2018, RHA expanded its reach by **bringing RiverFest to Irvington**. Irvington is New Jersey's eighth most densely populated town, more overcrowded than neighboring Newark. The partnership with Raritan Headwaters and Irvington School District provides much-needed environmental programming at the elementary school level. In the spring of 2019, RHA will welcome Irvington public school students to Fairview Farm to experience our outdoor classroom.



At Raritan Headwaters, we're experts in the science of water and how to protect it. We don't guess or assume. We base our actions and recommendations on the data we've collected.

MICROPLASTICS STUDY

Microplastics in the environment are impacting aquatic life and human health. These tiny bits of plastic can be mistaken for food by small fish and other organisms, which in turn are eaten by larger creatures and become part



We could not have done this ground-breaking study without our state-of-the-art lab house made possible by the Merck family and equipment funded by the John Ben Snow Memorial Trust! of the food web. Microplastics are also affecting our drinking water quality – in our homes, our schools and workplaces.

Dr. Kristi MacDonald, RHA's director of science, launched a pilot study in the South Branch of the Raritan River to study the potential sources of microplastics in the river. We worked with environmental science interns from Rutgers University to sample water at 10 locations upstream and downstream of wastewater treatment plants. Samples were brought back to the new Lab House at Fairview Farm for analysis - microplastics were present at all 10 sampling sites.

WHAT IS RHA DOING ABOUT IT?

Dr. Kristi McDonald is taking the lead to develop strategies to work with wastewater treatment plants to minimize the introduction of microplastics into our waterways and to educate the public on how to decrease their use of plastics. Secondly, policy director Bill Kiber is working in Trenton to support legislation that will help us reduce plastic use statewide. He is talking to legislators and helping them translate the plastic pollution issue to their constituents.

WHAT CAN YOU DO ABOUT IT?

WE HUMANS HAVE CREATED THE PROBLEM - SO HOW CAN WE HELP TURN THIS AROUND?

Here are a few simple things each of us can do every day to reduce microplastics in the environment:

- Use reusable grocery bags
- Say "no thank you" to plastic straws
- Avoid plastic bottles carry a reusable container
- Read labels be mindful of the materials in your clothes, soaps, toothpaste, and cleaning products
- Participate in RHA's Annual Stream Cleanup



EVERYONE CAN MAKE A POSITIVE IMPACT AT OUR ANNUAL STREAM CLEANUP!

In April 2018, over 1,600 volunteers removed 14 tons of trash from stream banks within the watershed, including 7,643 plastic bottles and 2,688 plastic bags. Not only does the cleanup beautify the areas around rivers and streams, it improves stream health by preventing litter from washing into the river and becoming a hazard to fish and wildlife. Every plastic item picked up is one less that will degrade into microplastic fragments.

STREAM MONITORING IN THE UPPER RARITAN WATERSHED - OUR 2018 REPORT CARD

So what is the state of our watershed? Between A-F, what grade do we give our streams? Sixteen percent of local streams scored "excellent" in water quality, 56 percent scored "good," 25 percent scored "fair," and 3 percent scored "poor." Streams with excellent or good ratings are acceptable for aquatic life, under the federal Clean Water Act, while streams with "fair" or "poor" ratings are not acceptable.

Our goal is to receive an 'A' for our entire watershed! RHA advocates that stream health can be improved through better stormwater management, green infrastructure, stream bank restorations, river-friendly best management practices and the protection of forests and wetlands.

If You Don't Test the Health of Your Drinking Water – Who Will?

Raritan Headwaters makes it easy and affordable to test the health of your drinking water.

For over 30 years, we have partnered with municipalities to offer residents the opportunity to test their water. We have 27 partner municipalities in our Community Well Test Program, including four that joined in 2018: Hillsborough, Bridgewater, Frenchtown, and Peapack-Gladstone. If you miss your community's testing dates, well testing is available year-round through our offices in Flemington and Bedminster.

In 2018, over 6,300 individual water samples were analyzed through our program. The most common tests were for coliform bacteria and nitrates, but we also tested 491 homes for lead and 534 wells for arsenic.

With over 64 inches of precipitation, 2018 was New Jersey's wettest year on record. Stormwater recharged our aquifers, carrying pollutants that entered wells. Our data demonstrated a dramatic spike in tests that failed for E. coli and coliform bacteria.


Due to concern for the abundant use of road salt throughout the region, we tested 400 wells for conductivity and salinity. Our tests indicate an increase in Chloride levels . Chloride is corrosive and may exacerbate lead issues in homes or mobilize other naturally-occurring groundwater contaminants like uranium and arsenic.

Awareness is the first step towards improved public health. If contamination is discovered in your drinking water, RHA can lead you to solutions to restore your clean water - and peace of mind!

FOX HILL PRESERVE, TEWKSBURY - A LINK IN A 10-MILE TRAIL

We are working with colleagues to fulfill a vision for a "10-Mile Trail" circling the village of Oldwick. Hiking and equestrian trails will wind through the countryside, connecting preserved parks and farms for citizens to enjoy.

RHA is proud to be owner of one link in this collaborative conservation effort. Our 65-acre Fox Hill Preserve was created in three parts -- first by the donation of 45 acres in 1974 by Mrs. Esther Johnson who strongly believed in the values of preservation and stewardship. She understood that donating the land to us was the best way to ensure that the property would remain in a natural condition, enhancing the health of the countryside and the entire community.

Our thanks to the Tewksbury Land Trust, New Jersey Conservation Foundation, Tewksbury Township and Hunterdon County for their partnership and of course, the families who had the foresight and conviction to protect the land and resources that define Tewksbury's bucolic landscapes.

Volunteers Help Steward our Preserved Lands

In 2018, 720 corporate partners, scouts, students and individual citizens worked to restore and improve the natural habitats on our wildlife preserves. These dedicated volunteers planted 1,215 native trees and shrubs, cleared trails, removed acres of invasive plants, and carried out important projects to enhance public access.








Fiscal Year October 1, 2017 - September 30, 2018


